Water & Sewer Chronology Updated January, 2021



Mayor Roop's Message

I know that the cost of providing water & sewer service is a concern of all of the residents of the town. We recently commissioned a study to examine our rates to determine the best and fairest rate moving forward. We adopted their advice to continue to keep our system solvent, but continue to look for ways to make our system better and more fiscally efficient.

Some residents have voiced their concerns about the water and sewer service in the Town. Many of the concerns raised dealt with the increase in the cost of providing water/sewer service, but some statements demonstrated that people didn't understand how utility service works in the Town or how we got to where we are. I would like to take a few minutes of your time to address issues that have been brought up. This Presentation should give you a better understanding of how we got to where were are today.



1964: Installation of Lagoons & Sewer Lines

2005: Initial Report from Maryland Department of Environment (MDE) notifying the Town of new and stricter discharge limits.

2005 - 2007: Council evaluates several new wastewater treatment systems.





2007: Wastewater Treatment Plant Feasibility evaluation completed by Dewberry

2008: MDE Inspection Report notes existing lagoon system will not be able to meet Nitrogen and Phosphorus limits and that it has been unable to meet Ammonia Nitrogen limits to take effect in 2010.



January, 2009: Special Information Meeting to discuss the new WWTP and the impact on sewer rates.

February, 2009: Meeting with MDE staff with Delegate Elliott, Town Manager Wally Brown and Mayor Roop to discuss a waiver & alternative funding solutions.

May, 2009: Letter from Senator Brinkley to MDE Secretary seeking a waiver to build the WWTP until funding is available. Request denied.

December, 2009: Notice to Proceed issued to Whiting-Turner to build new Wastewater Treatment Plant.

February, 2010: Mayor Roop submitted a request for funding to the offices of US Senator Mikulski, US Senator Cardin & Congressman Bartlett. Congress voted to eliminate appropriation requests.



January, 2011: Senator Brinkley submitted a Bill, "Maryland Water Quality Revolving Fund – Loan Forgiveness". Bill was struck down in a ruling by the Maryland Attorney General's Office.

April, 2011: Town Manager Schaeffer & Mayor Roop work to secure a \$550,000 supplemental grant from MDE to lower the WWTP loan. New loan amount, \$3,858, 474.

June, 2011: WWTP begins to discharge treat effluent into the stream.

July, 2011: Sewer rates increased to make WWTP loan payment. Base rate increased from \$30.00 to \$125.00.





Jan, Feb, Mar, 2012: Mayor Roop works with Delegate Donald Elliott and Delegate Maggie McIntosh, Chair of the Environmental Matters Committee to secure \$2,000,000.00 supplemental grant to lower the WWTP Loan.

April, 2012: Mayor Roop announces the approval of a \$2,000,000.00 grant to lower the WWTP loan. Lowering quarterly sewer base rates by \$50.00.



MARYLAND

Jan, Feb, Mar 2015: Mayor Roop works with Delegate Susan Krebs and Delegate Maggie McIntosh, Chair of the Appropriations Committee to secure \$1,000,000.00 supplemental grant to lower the WWTP Loan.

November, 2015: Mayor Roop announces the approval of a \$1,000,000.00 grant from the Chesapeake Bay Water Quality Project Funds Supplemental Assistance Program to lower the WWTP loan. Lowering quarterly sewer base rates by \$25.00.

May 2016: Two, fifty-two year old sewer pump stations were replaced at the cost of \$939,694.00. Loan was obtained through USDA.

Sewer Summary

With Mayor Roop's determination, the original WWTP loan of \$4,408,474.00 has been reduced by \$3,550,000.00. The three grants resulted in the Town receiving about 80% cost of the WWTP. With these three grants, quarterly sewer base rates were reduced by \$87.50.
