MD 31 Streetscape Project is finally moving along. The Town's responsibility is to replace the aging waterline on High Street and Main Street. Besides replacing the waterline, new meter vaults will be installed. This entails a new line from the water main to the property's meter vault. All meters inside homes will be removed. Four million dollars has been appropriated by the State of Maryland for this project. I want to thank our State Delegation for their assistance in providing funding for this overdue project. We hope to advertise for bids in October 2022.

MAYOR ROOP'S MESSAGE

The projected time for the replacement of the waterline is 18 months. With a construction project of this nature, there will be interruptions in traffic, noise, and inconveniences. I ask that you be patient and understanding during the construction period. Before the beginning of the project which will probably be in the Spring of 2023, there will be an informational meeting. Representatives from the Town, State Highway Administration (SHA), and the contractor will be in attendance to explain the process and answer questions. As with the College Avenue and Blue Ridge Avenue project, we will have weekly updates on what was completed and what properties will be affected in the upcoming week.

Once the waterline is replaced, the plan is for SHA to complete the Streetscape Project. The Town is requesting new ADA-compliant sidewalks, ramps, retaining walls, traffic calming designs, and new paving. We met with SHA on August 17 to discuss the project. At this time, there are some differences between SHA and the Town in the scope of work to be included. I will continue advocating for SHA to include retaining walls as I feel this is a very important safety component of the project. The difference in the scope of work also means more funding is needed by SHA. I've been communicating with Maryland Secretary of Budget and Management David Brinkley trying to get additional funding for SHA. With the recent announcement of a \$2B surplus from Fiscal Year 2022, I plan on requesting Governor Hogan put a funding recommendation in next year's state budget. Hopefully, the new Governor will support that recommendation.

The Dielman Inn Foundation Stabilization project is nearing completion. There is some remaining contract work to grade, seed, and stabilize the back lawn. The remainder of the fencing will come down soon. Lewis Contractors will be demobilizing the remainder of the construction items on the site and cleaning up. The project overall has come in under the anticipated budget. This has allowed the Town to perform some elective work on the project and still not use the entire amount of the grants.

My annual Mayor on the Square Food Drive is tentatively set for Friday, November 18 from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM. All food, coats, personal hygiene products, and monetary donations will go to the New Windsor Food Bank at St. Paul United Methodist Church. I will post a definite date on the Town's Facebook page in late October.

FY 2023 Water/Sewer Rates

Effective July 1st, 2022 water and sewer billing rates will be adjusted. You will see the adjustment beginning with the October 2022 quarterly billing. The new rates for sewer will be \$135.00 for the base rate and \$8.88 per thousand gallons for usage. Snow Emergency Routes

The Town Code states parking is prohibited on designated Town Snow Emergency Routes whenever a Snow Emergency has been declared by the State Highway Administration or the Maryland State Police. Parking is prohibited until the Snow Emergency is lifted and the streets are cleared of snow. The parking prohibition applies to all vehicles including towed vehicles such as trailers and campers. Having the streets clear of parked vehicles during snow events allows the Town crews to clear the snow more quickly and is safe for the Town residents and staff.

Please be advised that Maryland Transportation Article 21-1119 authorizes law enforcement officers to ticket and tow vehicles parked on snow emergency routes when a snow emergency is declared. Violators of this transportation article could be fined \$70. Violator's will also be responsible for the tow bill, if the vehicle is in fact towed.

When a snow emergency is declared by the State Highway Administration, the Town of New Windsor will post the declaration on the Town's Website and Facebook page. Please remember to stay educated during snow events. Whenever you hear the weatherman call for snow, play it safe and just remove your vehicle from the street so you are not burdened later with cost associated with violations.

Water Street

What is the best way to clean snow from the sidewalks? Remove snow along the sidewalk adjacent to your property. Do not push snow from the sidewalk into the street. Clear the snow from around the fire hydrant if there is one in front of your property. You should move the snow to you front yard, behind the stoop line, or the grass strip between the curb and sidewalk if one exists. Where possible try to clear a path at least three feet wide along the sidewalk. Corner property owners should clear a path for bus stops.

We understand it can be frustrating when our plows push snow back over an area you already shoveled however, please read below to understand why this happens and how to resolve it.

Why do snow plows leave a ridge at the end of my driveway? Who is responsible for clearing the ridge? Snow ridges are an unavoidable after-effect of plowing streets, particularly in larger or heavier snow storms. Public Works must plow to create a passable driving lane. While this clears a path for traffic, it may leave a snow ridge. We appreciate this concern. However, residents are responsible for clearing any ridge in front of their driveway. We suggest driveways be cleared after street snow clearing operations are conducted, this means when the full road is free of snow back to the curb.

Cul-De-Sacs are extremely difficult to plow and time consuming. <u>THANK YOU to residents who live on Cul-De-Sacs for your continued patience and understanding</u>

Park cars in driveways: Parking cars in the driveway will allow snow plows to clear the snow more quickly, get streets plowed as wide as possible and avoid the possibility of damaging cars.

Clear sidewalks within 24 hours of the end of the snow: Clearing the sidewalks is the responsibility of the property owner. Town code requires the sidewalks to be cleared within 24 hours of the end of the snow.



Did you know that September was the National Suicide and Substance Abuse Awareness month? Granted September is now over, but I wanted to take the time to discuss two important hotlines that just recently came about within the past few years, that you might not know about.

The first one is the new 9-8-8 hotline, which is the national phone number for the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, which was formerly the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. According to statistics, for every one person who completes suicide, there are 316 others that seriously consider suicide, but do not complete it. Statistics shown from 2020, the 9-8-8 hotline has received approximately 2.4 million calls to their 184 independent call centers,

across the nation and 23 million since its inception in 2005. Out of those 2.4 million calls, 42,934 were from Marylanders, which were handled within the state or local region. With the new 9-8-8 hotline, it is a vital entry point for coordinating care and providing Marylanders critical services for Maryland residents at serious risk. As a result, this new 9-8-8 hotline is helping reduce the burden on emergency medical services and law enforcement resources, so that they can better respond to other public safety needs, all the while saving thousands of taxpayers' dollars, one call at a time. So, if you are in need or know someone that is in need, please realize that you are not alone and please reach out or share the 9-8-8 hotline for those in need.

The second one is the 2-1-1 hotline, which connects Marylanders to several services including the following: Aging and disabilities, family services, domestic violence, employment, health care, food assistance, housing, immigration, legal services, mental health, discrimination, substance abuse, tax services, utility assistance, and veteran services. Granted the 2-1-1 hotline has been around Maryland since 2018, after it took over the 1-800 crisis hotline. For faster service, regarding suicide prevention, mental health services, and substance abuse interventions, callers should dial 2-1-1 then press 1 to be connected to resources.

So, if you are ever in a crisis or need financial assistance, please contact either hotline for help.

Lastly, to assist with the opioid drug epidemic, on October 29, 2022, the Drug Enforcement Agency holds annual prescription drug takeback of unneeded and expired prescription drugs, so these drugs don't end up getting in the wrong hands or into our local land-fills. With that being said, I will be collecting unwanted or expired medications (pills only) at the New Windsor NWSB parking lot from 9AM until 12 Noon on October 29, 2022. I will then move to Union Bridge Town Square (Main Street @ Broadway Street) where I will collect medications from 1PM to 3PM, on October 29, 2022. Unfortunately, I will not be collecting hypodermic needles (sharps) or liquid medications during that time. So, please clean out your medication cabinets and bring those unwanted or expired medications to be disposed of on October 29, 2022.

As always, please stay calm, be kind to one another and stay safe out there.
