Dear Neighbors,

It is an incredible honor to have earned your trust as the new mayor of our beloved Town. I'm deeply grateful for the support you showed during the campaign, and I'm proud to be your partner in shaping a brighter future for New Windsor. I'd also like to take a moment to congratulate our new Council Members – Danté Howard and Joshua Wolfe Mallow. Thank you, gentlemen, for answering the call for service to your Town.

Further, I'd like to thank our residents for your patience as MDOT State Highway Administration's paving contractor, CJ Miller, completes the milling and repaving of High Street and Main Street as detailed on the Town's website. We realize that this is a slight inconvenience but in a few short weeks, the work will be completed, and we'll have smooth roads to travel. Please drive safely and courteously.

Listening and Learning

Over the past month, I've been in the community having conversations with fellow residents to get a first-hand understanding of the direction that you would like to see for our Town. Thank you to the residents who shared their ideas and suggestions. Please know that this is just the beginning of my initiative to Listen and Learn about the things that you, as residents, think are best for our Town.

Early Priorities

As I mentioned during the campaign, the Town will continue to seek funding, through Public Grants, to support our on-going projects like the Deilman Inn, 211 High Street and future upgrades to our water system. In addition, we are investigating grant-funding through Sustainable Maryland for proposed projects like Community Gardens and Town Connectivity Walking Paths.

Secondly, but equally as important, we will begin an initiative to strengthen our relationships with our local businesses. Over the next few months, I will be working with the Town Council to establish New Windsor's Business Roundtable. Ideally, this group would meet on a quarterly basis starting in the Fall of 2025.

Call for Volunteers

The Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall will be visiting the New Windsor Fire Department's Carnival Grounds October 9 through October 13, 2025. This 3/5 scale of the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C. stands six feet tall at the center and covers almost 300 feet from end to end.

This change is being made in compliance with the new Maryland Heat Stress Standards to protect the health and safety of workers during extreme heat.

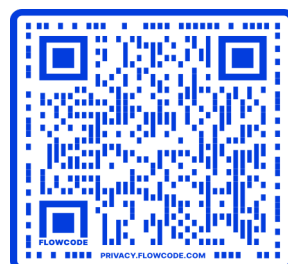

TRASH & RECYCLING PICK-UP IS WEDNESDAY EACH WEEK UNLESS SPECIFIED IN THE TOWN CALENDAR.

- Your trash must be taken out the night before to ensure pick up.
- Each stop may have up to 3 trash containers of household refuse per week with each container limited to 25 pounds.
- Each stop may also have up to 3 recycle totes per week with each toter limited to 25 pounds.

YARD WASTE

Yard waste pick up is the first full week of the month and the 3rd week of the month. Dates are firm, unless an emergency or inclement weather occurs. Rain dates are the following Monday.



Collection Reminders:

1. Yard waste can be put in brown paper yard waste bags (can be purchased at Walmart, Lowe's or Home Depot).
2. Yard waste can be put into cans. Please make sure lids fit and holes are drilled in the bottom of the can for drainage. Please, NO cans that are broken and/or have sharp edges.
3. Tree limbs can NOT exceed more than 4 feet long and 4 inches in diameter and must be tied into bundles.
4. Please NO DOG WASTE or trash mixed into yard waste!!

MUNICIPAL MINUTE

Water & Sewer Updates

- Reminder - Effective July 1, 2025, all charges for water and sewer usage will be the responsibility of the property owner. Please visit the Town's webpage to view Ordinance No. 02-05-25 for more information.
- At the March 17, 2025, work session, Council approved a water and sewer rate adjustment to a tiered system. The tiered system was formally adopted with Resolution 05-07-25A at the May 7, 2025, regular meeting. Residents will see the tiered system in their October 2025 water and sewer bill. The tiered system rates are as follows:



Water Base Rate - \$102/qtr.

Water Usage Rate - \$9.50 per 1,000 gallons up to 20,000/qtr. and \$11.50 per 1,000 gallons over 20,000/qtr.

Sewer Base Rate - \$100/qtr.

Sewer Usage Rate - \$11.50 per 1,000 gallons up to 20,000/qtr. and \$12.00 per 1,000 gallons over 20,000/qtr.

Using the tiered system, it is estimated that 64% of residents will see a decrease in their water and sewer bills. Please visit the Town's webpage to view the ordinance.

Tips to Save Money on Your Water Bill

1. Fix Leaks:

- Regularly check for leaks in toilets, faucets, and pipes.
A dripping faucet can waste gallons of water per day. Check for leaks in your toilet by adding a few drops of food coloring to the tank and waiting for a while. If the color appears in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak.

2. Install Water-Efficient Fixtures:

- Consider installing low-flow toilets, faucets, and showerheads. Low-flow toilets can reduce water use by 20-60% annually.
- Install aerated faucets. Aerated faucets can reduce water usage without compromising water pressure. Low-flow showerheads can save around 2,700 gallons of water per year.

3. Adjust Your Habits:

- Take shorter showers: Each minute you shave off your shower can save 2-3 gallons of water.
- Turn off the tap: Don't let the water run unnecessarily when brushing your teeth or washing your face.
- Store drinking water: Store water in the refrigerator instead of letting the tap run for a cold drink.
- Run full loads: Use your dishwasher and washing machine only when they are fully loaded.
- Consider composting: Instead of using a garbage disposal, start a compost pile for food scraps.
- Sweep instead of hose: Sweep outdoor areas like sidewalks and driveways instead of hosing them down.

4. Water Wisely Outdoors:

- Water only when needed: Pay attention to your lawn and plants to determine when they need watering.
- Follow watering schedules: Adhere to any local watering restrictions or schedules.
- Don't overwater: Only apply enough water to fill the plant's root zone.
- Install a programmable sprinkler system: This can help adjust your watering schedule based on local weather data.

By making these small changes, you can significantly reduce your water consumption and lower your water bill.

Code Enforcement

Summer Grass Cutting

As a friendly reminder, grass and lawns need to be maintained regularly to comply with Town code regulations as stated below.

§144-2(A) - Every property within the Town of New Windsor and every part thereof shall be kept so clean and free from any accumulation of dirt, filth, rubbish, garbage or similar matter as not to be a danger to the health of any occupant or user thereof and shall be kept free from vermin and rodent infestation. All yards, lawns and vacant lots shall be similarly kept clean and free from weeds exceeding 12 inches in height. The property owner or owners shall maintain abutting roadside improvements along the portion of the



property that abuts the public road or right-of-way, including any vegetation between the sidewalk and the curb or street, including any trees located therein, regardless of the property lines or right-of-way boundaries. The property owner or owners shall also trim or remove all or any portion of any tree, hedge or other vegetation which overhangs or encroaches upon the sidewalk or right-of-way area or which creates an obstruction to view. It shall be the duty of each occupant or owners of a property to keep in a clean condition that portion of the property which he or she occupies or over which he or she has exclusive control.

Vehicles

New Windsor has adopted codes to insure properties don't become junk yards, which supports clean and safe neighborhoods. These efforts help provide community stability and consistent property values. Section 189 of the Town Code addresses many vehicle issues such as untagged vehicles, inoperable vehicles and abandon vehicles.

Noncompliance with Town code regulations could result in a fine being issued. Please be a good neighbor and maintain your property in an appropriate condition.

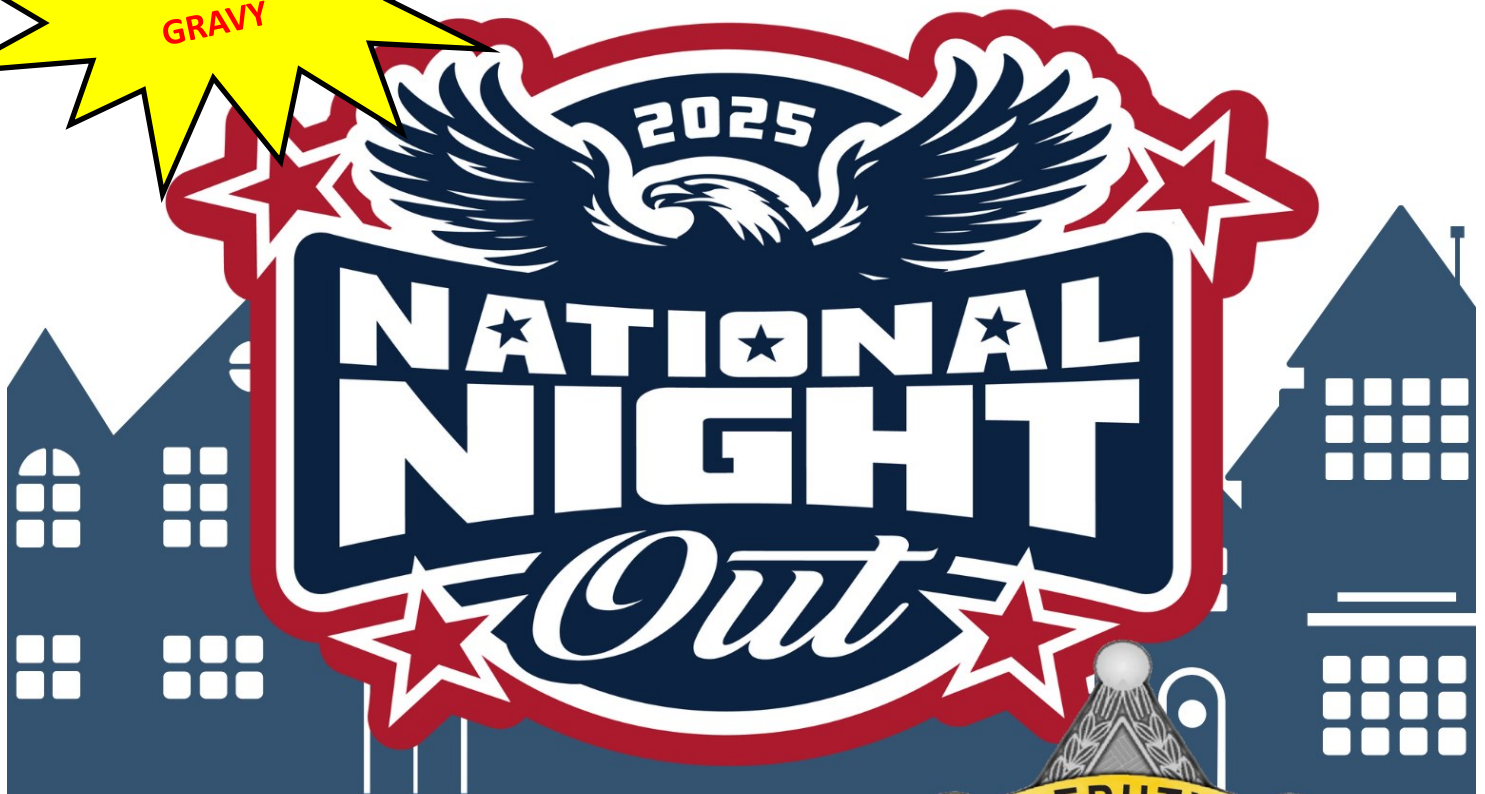

Important Information Concerning Your Drinking Water

We're pleased to present to you the Annual Water Quality Report for 2024. This report is designed to inform you about the water quality and services we deliver to you every day. Maryland Environmental Service (MES), an Agency of the State of Maryland, operates the water treatment facility and prepared this report on behalf of the Town of New Windsor.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulates Public Water Systems and the contaminants found in water through the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). The SDWA sets regulations and guidelines for how public water systems operate and identifies several hundred drinking water contaminants, establishes monitoring frequencies and limitations. The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) is responsible for the enforcement of the SDWA and routinely complete Sanitary Surveys as part of their ongoing inspection and monitoring program. MES provides safe dependable operations of the water system and is dedicated to consistently providing high quality drinking water that meets or exceeds the SDWA standards.

The Town of New Windsor water works consists of two drilled wells in the Sams Creek Phyllite formation and a natural spring. After water is pumped out of the wells and collected from the spring, disinfectant is added to protect against microbial contaminants. The Maryland Department of the Environment has performed an assessment of the source water. A copy of the results is available. Call **Maryland Environmental Service at 410-729-8350.**

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. Definitions:

- ◆ **Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)** - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- ◆ **Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)** - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- ◆ **Action Level** - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- ◆ **Treatment Technique (TT)** - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
- ◆ **Turbidity** - Relates to a condition where suspended particles are present in the water. Turbidity measurements are a way to describe the level of "cloudiness" of the water.
- ◆ **pCi/l** - Picocuries per liter. A measure of radiation.
- ◆ **ppb** - parts per billion or micrograms per liter
- ◆ **ppm** - parts per million or milligrams per liter
- ◆ **ppt** - parts per trillion or nanograms per liter

Special Points of Interest

Drinking Water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some compounds. The presence of these compounds does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Lead Prevention

Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Town of New Windsor is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing. You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in the table is from testing done January 1 – December 31, 2024. The State requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year.

Sources of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain compounds in water provided by public water systems. The Cooperative treats our water according to EPA's regulations. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.



Contaminants That May Be Present in Source Water

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife. Pesticides and Herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses. Inorganic Contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming. Organic Chemical Contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems. Radioactive Contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Polyfluoroalkyl Substances

PFAS – short for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances – refers to a large group of more than 4,000 human-made chemicals that have been used since the 1940s in a range of products, including stain- and water-resistant fabrics and carpeting, cleaning products, paints, cookware, food packaging and fire-fighting foams. These uses of PFAS have led to PFAS entering our environment, where they have been measured by several states in soil, surface water, groundwater, and seafood. Some PFAS can last a long time in the environment and in the human body and can accumulate in the food chain.

The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) conducted a PFAS monitoring program for Community Water Systems from 2020 to 2022. No PFAS sampling was conducted for the Town of New Windsor Water Treatment System during 2024. The 2022 results are available on MDE's website:

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) finalized regulations for 6 PFAS compounds in drinking water in April 2024. The MCLs for PFOA and PFOS are each 4.0 parts per trillion (ppt). The MCLs for PFNA, PFHxS, and HFPO-DA (GenX chemicals) are each 10 ppt. Additionally, a mixture of two or more of the following chemicals (PFNA, PFHxS, HFPO-DA, and PFBS) will be regulated with a Hazard Index of 1 (unitless) to determine if the combined levels of these PFAS pose a risk and require action.

The 5th Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (UCMR5) began testing for 29 PFAS compounds and lithium in 2023. The UCMR5 should test all community water systems with populations of at least 3300 people. Three randomly selected systems in Maryland with populations less than 3300 people will also be tested under the UCMR5. Detections greater than the minimum reporting levels for each constituent should be reported in the CCR.

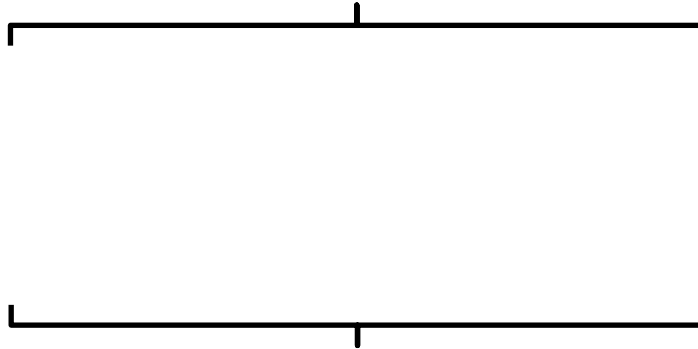
